The ILDS provides leadership and support through global initiatives, projects and policies to help people affected by skin disease.





What we do

The World Congress of Dermatology

Organised by the ILDS, the World Congress of Dermatology (WCD) is one of the largest dermatology meetings in the world. The event enables specialists to share their knowledge, research results and clinical experiences, and build their professional networks.

The first WCD was held in Paris in 1889 and is held every four years (where possible). Over the past 135 years, the WCD has brought together experts and relevant organisations and raised the importance of skin diseases.

ILDS Member Societies can bid to host the WCD with the location chosen through a competitive bidding process and a vote by ILDS Members at the ILDS Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Our official relations with the World Health Organization

The ILDS is the **only dermatological organisation** in official relations with the World Health Organization (WHO), enabling us to raise multiple dermatological issues at the highest level.

The ILDS visits the WHO-HQ in Geneva annually for meetings with the WHO units/departments we collaborate with. These include:

- International Classification of Diseases
- Neglected Tropical Diseases
- Non-Communicable Diseases
- Occupational Health

- Ageing and Life Course
- Emerging Infections.

Essential Medicines

The ILDS contributes to its work and priorities by:

- continuing refinement of the ICD-11 MMS and Dermatology Specialty classifications in relation to skin and related diseases:
- improving recognition of NTDs by front-line healthcare workers using skin signs of disease;
- providing assistance with revisions to list of skin condition related essential medicines: and
- providing technical assistance on ultraviolet radiation-induced skin disease.





International Foundation of Dermatology



International Foundation for Dermatology

The International Foundation for Dermatology (IFD) was created in 1987 by the ILDS to improve skin health in areas of low resource. It supports projects all over the world including Africa, Asia Pacific and South America. The IFD is critical to helping ILDS achieve its goal of #SkinHealth4theWorld.

In 2022 alone, the IFD distributed \$ 500,000 in funding and worked with a global network of partners to support skin health initiatives in low-resource areas worldwide that are available, accessible and effective for all patients, regardless of ethnicity, disability or social background. Key projects include the Regional Dermatology Training Centre in Tanzania and the Community Skin Health journal, as well as projects in Argentina, Cambodia and Mexico to name a few.

Our projects and programmes

The aim of the GPEC programme is to improve the standard of dermatological education and care worldwide, through facilitating mutual learning partnerships between organisations. We seek to pair up dermatology departments to establish bi-directional knowledge exchange, furthering ILDS' vision to attain the best possible skin health for all people around the world.

We work closely with the World Health Organization (WHO) and other partners to support the prevention and control of NCDs. Building on the success of the <u>Global Psoriasis Atlas</u> which was established in 2017 in response to the <u>WHO Global Report on Psoriasis</u> (2016), ILDS is working with a range of stakeholders to develop other Atlases to promote access to skin health across a range of dermatological conditions, including the Global Atopic Dermatitis Atlas launched in 2022.

Skin NTDs continue to have a low profile and status in public health priorities. To help address this, Neglected Tropical Diseases NGO Network (NNN) members established the Skin NTD Cross-Cutting Group to ensure that these neglected diseases receive adequate attention and financial support within the WHO NTD Roadmap 2021-2030. The International Foundation for Dermatology (IFD) is a member of the NNNSCCG and also provides operational support to the Group. IFD Chair, Dr Claire Fuller, is the NNNSCCG Chair.







The ILDS leads the Dermatology Topic Advisory Group (TAG) for the 11th revision of the ICD. The ILDS has been involved in the revision since 2008 when we were invited to be the ICD-11 TAG leader. Over the last decade, the TAG has overseen the revision of the 'Diseases of the Skin' chapter as well as many dermatologically relevant diseases located in other chapters of ICD. There are now over 2,000 different defined skin disorders that have been characterised as part of the ICD-11 development process.



Through the IFD, the ILDS provides two types of grants programmes: DermLink and DermImpact. DermLink is an annual grants programme that provides support for ILDS Members to undertake initiatives that help patients with skin disease in underserved parts of the world. DermImpact Grants Programme provides support for projects that are looking to build capacity in underserved regions/communities to improve care and services for patients with skin diseases.

The ILDS World Skin Summit brings the leaders of our Member and Partner organisations together to discuss the challenges they face. The Summit provides an opportunity for leaders to share experiences and develop strategies to improve skin health at local, national, regional and global levels.



World Skin Health Day is a joint project of the International League of Dermatological Societies (ILDS) and the International Society of Dermatology (ISD). Since 2013, World Skin Health Day has been taking place across the world to raise awareness of and treat a diverse range of skin conditions. Taking part in World Skin Health Day helps to raise awareness about the wide-ranging impact of skin disease, as well as supporting people needing treatment in their local communities.





The Community Skin Health Journal (CSH) is the official Journal of the IFD (formerly known as the Community Dermatology Journal). It is a dermatology resource for healthcare workers in under-served areas and it provides up to date, relevant information on the diagnosis and treatment of skin disease. It is a useful resource for educating health workers and the populations they serve and for keeping in touch with dermatology services in low-resource areas.







In 1990, the <u>Regional Dermatology Training Centre</u> (<u>RDTC</u>) in Moshi, Tanzania, was founded as a joint enterprise between the ILDS and the Tanzanian Ministry of Health, Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Centre. The RDTC serves as a supra-regional training, research and clinical centre providing care to dermatological patients and training to medical Assistants and Clinical Officers. Following the success of the RDTC, the ILDS has recently committed funds to advance dermatology training for the Pacific Island Nations through the support of the <u>Pacific Dermatology Training Centre (PDTC)</u> at Tamavua Twomey Hospital in Suva, Fiji.











The ILDS is continuously finding new ways to make a difference to the global community through dermatology so please do check our website regularly for news of new projects and ways to get involved.

Partnerships and Networks

The theme for our 2020-2023 Strategy, Global Partnerships for Skin Health, recognised our increasingly interconnected world where health issues cross borders and that we can only achieve our vision of 'Skin Health for the World' by working with others.

The partnerships that we foster through our activities lead to improvements in the quality and availability of skin health resources and services worldwide. Strengthening partnerships and networks facilitates the development of innovative ideas, knowledge transfer and understanding between groups and individuals with shared as well as different experiences. These connections provide opportunities to raise awareness of the cross-cutting nature of skin health and to increase the profile of dermatology globally.

The ILDS is committed to the inclusion of the patient voice in our work and we collaborate with patients' organisations across a range of areas. The ILDS Patients' Organisations Committee was set up in 2020 to ensure that the patients' voice is considered in ILDS activities and to foster dialogue and partnerships between the ILDS, its Members, and patients' organisations to improve access to dermatological patient-centred healthcare worldwide.

Founded by Dr Esther Freeman and Dr Claire Fuller in 2018, the GLODERM's mission is to improve 'Skin Health for Everyone, Everywhere' by connecting dermatologists and trainees who are dedicated to improving skin health for all in resource-limited communities, locally and globally. With multiple activities and programmes, including the GLODERM Mentorship Programme, training the next generation of global health dermatology leaders, and a free Educational Webinar Series.







The ILDS and the International Alliance of Dermatology Patient Organizations (also known as GlobalSkin) are working together to produce a series of webinars across a range of dermatological issues bringing together dermatologists and patient leaders in a forum to share experiences and information.





The ILDS is proud to be a founding partner of the World Skin Health Coalition.

This Coalition brings together a multi-stakeholder group of like-minded organisations focused on putting medical dermatology on the global health agenda. It will advocate to the World Health Organization (WHO) and other decision makers globally to elevate the healthcare prioritisation of dermatological diseases.







The Migrant Health Dermatology Working Group (MHDWG) of the IFD brings together global specialists to discuss skin health issues facing migrants and refugees, developing and sharing best practice as advocates for improved skin health provision for migrants, refugees and internally displaced people (IDPs).



The ILDS' ongoing commitment to improving skin health around the world continues to provide many opportunities to expand our network with new collaborations and partnerships.

Classes of membership

Member Society

For the main/primary national society of dermatology within each country working within the field of dermatology - representing members from its own (one) country (such as AAD or SIDeMaST). In countries where there is more than one national society, proof may be required that there is little/no overlap of members. 50% + 1 (majority) of its members MUST be dermatologists and the Society MUST have been established/ registered for more than 4 years.

Votes: Allocated based on number of fee-paying members (maximum of 10 votes per Member Society) as per ILDS By-Laws.

Affiliated Society

For international or regional dermatological societies of dermatology or national specialist societies working within the field of dermatology representing dermatologists internationally or regionally (such as EADV, CILAD etc) OR national specialist societies of dermatology (such as the lymphoma, photodermatology or MOHS for example). 50% + 1 (majority) of its members MUST be dermatologists and the Society MUST have been established/ registered for more than 4 years.

Votes: Entitled to one vote as per ILDS By-Laws.

Observer Society

For societies within the field of dermatology that are not yet eligible to become a Member Society or Affiliated Society i.e.. those who meet the criteria but are under 4 years old. Also includes those who have applied for Member / Affiliated Society Membership and have been approved in the year preceding a World Congress of Dermatology (category changes following the WCD year).

Votes: Not entitled to vote as per ILDS By-Laws.

ILDS Awards

The ILDS, as part of its work in global dermatology, aims to recognise dermatologists and others in the field of dermatological care who have made an outstanding contribution to improving the experience for people with skin diseases.

One of the benefits of ILDS membership is the opportunity for societies to nominate their members (subject to eligiblity) for one of our prestigious ILDS Awards - the Certificate of Appreciation (COA) or the Young Dermatologist International Achievement (YDIA) Award - providing recipients with global recognition for their work.

Certificate of Appreciation

The ILDS Certificate of Appreciation is awarded annually and aims to recognise dermatologists and others in the field of dermatological care who have made an outstanding contribution in either International Leadership or Humanitarian Dermatology.

Eligible ILDS Members may nominate up to 2 people in total from their society - these can be two nominations in one category or one nomination in each category.

Young Dermatologist International Achievement (YDIA) Award

The YDIA Award is awarded biennially, to coincide with the World Congress of Dermatology (WCD) and the ILDS World Skin Summit (WSS), to recognise recently qualified dermatologists who have made an outstanding contribution to international dermatology, particularly for patients in under-served areas of the world.

The Award is presented to one individual from each of the six ILDS Regions and recipients are invited to attend the WCD/WSS. The Awards are presented by the ILDS President.
